## 01. Choose a topic for your essay

## 02. Collect data



Before starting, you should collect all the necessary data related to your topic. All the claims and arguments should be backed by supportive evidence.

## 03. Create an outline

Create a proper outline for your essay and divide it into necessary parts. The three components are the introduction, body paragraphs and the conclusion.



## 04. Introduction



Start your essay with an impressive hook that can capture the attention of your readers. The introduction of your essay should be compelling.

## 05. Write a strong thesis statement

The thesis statement is the crux of any essay and reflects the main idea. Generally, a thesis statement constitutes the last few lines of the introduction.



## 06. Body Paragraphs



Your body paragraphs include the arguments before your reader. Present an issue before your reader by analyzing all the angles associated with that topic.

## 07. Conclusion

The conclusion should be concise and logical. You can restate the thesis statement in conclusion, which can be your side of the argument too.



## 08. Proofread before submitting



Always proofread your essay before submitting and look out for minor mistakes like typing errors, spelling mistakes or grammatical mistakes.
