Against All Odds Dawoud Sabu Adeyola, 2017-05-31. African American music has been a major contributor to the cultural landscape of America. Its evolution from religious chants, field hollers, work songs, and cadences of African

captives in America to the multibillion industry that it is today has been the subject of much research and scholastic inquiry. With the exception of a very few, most of these studies and published results have not been done by the musicians themselves from start to finish. Stride! John L. Fell, Terkild Vinding, 1999-01-28. *Stride* traces the stride piano style from its roots in minstrel shows and ragtime through the contributions of itinerant entertainers to its joyful birth in Harlem, where it became known as Harlem Piano Stride. Developed over a period spanning World War I to the depression years, though younger players maintain its traditions today, it is a musical style marked by friendly rivalry and shared pleasures.
